## 1 WINTER SWBA PROGRAM: LIVE BUTTERFLIES AT MILWAUKEE PUBLIC MUSEUM

### Saturday, February 28: Live Butterflies at Milwaukee Public Museum

Mark this on your calendar! This is a fun way to butterfly-kiss winter goodbye and anticipate the colorful delights of warmer seasons! We will carpool and travel to the vast Milwaukee Public Museum to receive a special, behind-the-scenes guided tour of Bugs Alive! and the Puelicher Butterfly Garden, a two-story, glass-enclosed wing of the museum, which has live butterflies. The numerous colorful native and tropical butterflies (such as the giant electric-blue Morpho) often land on visitors! We are fortunate to have this special tour led by Susan Borkin, the Director of the Puelicher Garden and Director of Research Support for the Museum. Surrounding the Garden are displays of more than 1,000 species of butterflies and moths from the museum collection. We will also get a RARE, behind-the-scenes look at the Museum's extensive



collections. The tour will last 2-3 hours. (We will eat lunch at the Museum's Cafe and afterwards you can attend any of the numerous other exhibits (Rain Forest, Titanic, Living Oceans, etc.) or enjoy the domed IMAX theatre or planetarium. The Museum Admission fee is \$11, Senior \$10.

We will meet in Madison to carpool at 7:45 a.m. or you can meet at 9:30 a.m. at a designated location in the Museum. 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### 5 LECTURE AT UW ARBORETUM

**Thursday, Feb. 12: "Wisconsin Milkweeds and Their Specialized Fauna"**

Andrew Williams, Honorary Fellow in Entomology, UW-Madison.

Plants and bugs – it doesn't get a whole lot better than that. Andrew Williams has spent his professional life studying the milkweeds of Wisconsin (all 15 species) and the small creatures that interact with them. He says that every native plant species or genus has its own suite of specialist insects – he just happens to have zeroed in on this particular group. Long-horned beetles, leaf beetles, weevils, aphids, Lepidopterans – a vast array of insects visit the milkweeds, and have evolved fascinating ways of dealing with the plants' toxic juices. Be prepared for stunning photographs!

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### 6 SCIENCE NEWS: New research documents the benefit of using native plants in your yard.

**Impact of Native Plants on Bird and Butterfly Biodiversity in Suburban Landscapes**

**ABSTRACT:** Managed landscapes in which non-native ornamental plants are favored over native vegetation now dominate the United States, particularly east of the Mississippi River. We measured how landscaping with native plants affects the avian and lepidopteran communities on 6 pairs of suburban properties in southeastern Pennsylvania. One property in each pair was landscaped entirely with native plants and the other exhibited a more conventional suburban mixture of plants. Vegetation sampling confirmed that total plant cover and plant diversity did not differ between treatments, but non-native plant cover was greater on the conventional sites and native plant cover was greater on the native sites. Several avian

and larval lepidopteran community parameters were measured from June 2006 to August 2006. **CONCLUSION:** Native properties supported significantly more caterpillars and caterpillar species and significantly greater bird abundance, diversity, species richness, biomass, and breeding pairs of native species. Of particular importance is that bird species of regional conservation concern were 8 times more abundant and significantly more diverse on native properties. In our study area, native landscaping positively influenced the avian and lepidopteran carrying capacity of suburbia and provided a mechanism for reducing biodiversity losses in human-dominated landscapes.

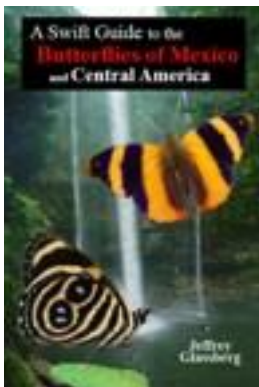

The Darwin Day celebration, which is **free and open to the public**, will also include afternoon sessions showcasing the research of UW-Madison faculty, a panel discussion on science and the media, a teachers' workshop and a book-signing event.
