Jeff is a past-president of Xerces Society, the author of the Butterflies through Binoculars field guide series, the editor of the Glassberg field guide series (including Caterpillars, Dragonflies and Wildflowers) and the author of *Butterflies of North America*. His latest book is *A Swift Guide to the Butterflies of Mexico and Central America*. He graduated from the Columbia University School of Law in 1993 and is a member of the New York bar. He is currently an Adjunct Professor of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at Rice University.
